



World Council of Optometry and Alcon Expand Partnership to Promote Dry Eye Disease Education

ST. LOUIS (January 27, 2026) The World Council of Optometry (WCO) and Alcon have renewed their [education initiative](#) to advance dry eye disease professional education globally. The partnership's multifaceted initiatives surrounding mitigation, measurement, and management of dry eye disease have garnered widespread exposure and interest since it began in 2022.

A chronic, painful condition, dry eye disease impacts 1.6 billion people worldwide.¹ Reports of rise in occurrence correspond with factors such as increasing use of technology, environmental triggers, and an aging population.²

WCO President Cindy Tromans, BSc (Hons), PhD, FEAPO, said, "We are excited to extend and build upon our partnership with Alcon for the fourth year. Creating new ways to support dry eye education for optometrists globally is essential, as the disease can lead to additional complications and declines in quality of life without proper identification and management. The microsite also includes a series of dry eye webinars recorded with the professors and provides a collection of additional tools for clinicians and educators.
